Businessman David R. Nevy Dead At 83

David R. Nevy, 83-year-old local businessman, died Wednesday in St. Joseph's Hospital, Baltimore, where he was admitted March 24. He underwent surgery there early last month.

Born at Bergotto, Italy, a son of the late Anthony and Catherine (Grassi) Nevy, he came to Cumberland in 1915 and with his brothers founded the Cumberland Macaroni Manufacturing Company. He remained active in the business until his illness in March.

Mr. Nevy also was president of an affiliated firm, Galvanoni and Nevy Brothers Inc. of New York City, and was the senior partner and founder of the Nevy Brothers store in Vintondale, Pa., where he resided before coming to Cumberland.

Illness Is Fatal To David R. Nevy

David R. Nevy, 83-year-old Cumberland, Md., businessman who traveled throughout southern West Virginia for 30 years died Wednesday in a Baltimore hospital after a short illness.

Mr. Nevy was president of the Galvaconi and Nevy Bros., Inc., of New York City, importers of Italian cheeses and oils. He founded a Nevy Bros. store in Pennsylvania and the Cumberland Macaroni Manufacturing Co. in 1915. Mr. Nevy traveled in the Charleston, Huntington and Clarksburg areas for many years.

Service will be held tomorrow at 10 a.m. in S S Peter and Paul Catholic Church in Cumberland. Burial will be in St. Mary's Cemetery.

The body is at George Funeral Home in Cumberland.
